Devin Ebanks is another player whose draft stock fell over the course of the previous season. A borderline lottery pick last year, Ebanks is now a borderline first round pick this year. Ebanks is a skilled small forward. He has decent ball handling skills. He is a very good passer and slasher. When giving proper effort, Ebanks is a very good defender due to his quickness and a 7'0.25" wingspan. Ebanks was a productive rebounder in his two seasons at West Virginia. He is a very good athlete with a lot of potential.

Ebanks is not a good jump shooter. In two years, Ebanks went 8-for-70 from 3-point territory. He will probably never develop legitimate NBA 3-point range. There will be times Ebanks will play the four in the NBA. As of now, he is not nearly strong enough to defend any kind of power forward. There are also question marks surrounding his intangibles.
